



A New National Network from E Pluribus: Immigrant Entrepreneurship Peer Network

Why This Network Matters

Immigrant entrepreneurs are essential to thriving local economies. They launch restaurants, retail shops, childcare businesses, construction firms, professional services, and other Main Street enterprises that create jobs, activate commercial corridors, and strengthen communities. Immigrant entrepreneurs also play important roles in trucking, transportation and logistics, and computer software design firms. Many begin as microentrepreneurs, yet **too often face barriers that traditional small business systems are not designed to address**—from limited access to capital and trusted support to language barriers and unfamiliar business practices. Additionally, many immigrant business owners lack access and familiarity with small business programs and opportunities.

Communities that intentionally remove these barriers and that intentionally connect immigrant entrepreneurs to business support programs and resources create stronger entrepreneurial ecosystems and more vibrant local economies.

The Immigrant Entrepreneurship Peer Network brings together practitioners from across the country who are working to make entrepreneurial ecosystems more inclusive of immigrants and who are actively fostering opportunities for immigrant entrepreneurs to connect with regional business support programs and resources. Participants include community-based organizations, welcoming initiatives, economic development organizations, financial institutions, local governments, universities, chambers of commerce, and other partners committed to helping immigrant entrepreneurs succeed, including existing small business support programs.

Whether your work is just beginning or well established, the Network offers a place to deepen your practice, learn from peers, and strengthen opportunities for immigrant entrepreneurs and the communities they call home.
